The Passing of a Good Friend

Sadly, on September 12, 2016, we learned of the passing of Mike Sergeant. The name may not be familiar to all, but we know him best as the founder of Southeastern Guide Dogs. We met Mike when we became puppy raisers and grew to love and respect him as we volunteered at the school. We watched him pour his heart and soul into building the school. Mike loved dog training and had been training dogs since his work with search & rescue/drug sniffing dogs in Viet Nam. In 1972 he became a qualified guide dog instructor and worked for Guiding Eyes for the Blind in Yorktown Heights, NY. In 1980, he was hired by Pilot dogs in Columbus Ohio. There he continued training, supervised apprentice trainers and headed the puppy program.

By 1982, Mike had 12 years in the field and came to a realization. All the existing guide dog schools were located in northern states or California. Dogs, like people become adapted to the environment and many have trouble adapting to a dramatically different environment such as Florida. Any blind person living in the south had no choice but to go to a northern state to get their guide dog. When returning home, it became evident that some dogs could not adapt to the heat, humidity and severe thunderstorms that are part of living in Florida. Mike felt that a school based in Florida where the puppies could be born and raised in the environment in which they would work was a logical conclusion. So, he and his wife Jan moved to Palmetto and with the help of the Bradenton Lions they acquired a small plot of land, a modest house and a hand selected group of pups to train.

With any new enterprise especially one of this size and scope, there were a lot of struggles, the greatest of which being financial ones. With the help of the local community and some very prominent business people, Mike was able to pioneer the development of a new regional guide dog school. In the next 20 years, Mike would oversee the creation of: a board of directors, development department, established a training department, breeding program, puppy raising program, and layered the foundation for acquiring funds through grants, wills and fund raising for a major expansion of the facilities.

The Freedom Walk was named after Mike Sergeant's beloved block head Labrador he brought in with the first string of dogs. The dog as well as the name, Freedom, became Mike's anthem. His first love had always been training, but the growing demands of Southeastern required him to do primarily administrative duties. Since this was not his strong suit and the school continued to grow, reluctantly, Mike left to pursue what he did the best, train guide dogs.

In 2003, Wells Jones, CEO of Guide Dog Foundation, with full recognition of Mike's talents brought him aboard. Chuck and I continued to follow his work at GDF and the fact that he went there after leaving Southeastern was a determining factor to our agreeing to coordinate a puppy group for GDF after we left Southeastern in 2011. We lost track of him and had heard he retired, but we never forgot him or the impact he has had in the guide dog community.

Mike Sergeant's accomplishments in training guide dogs could fill a book, and would take a great amount of time. With 40 years of experience, it's hard to highlight all he has done. I want to thank Wells Jones for sending me the following so I can at least honor Mike's memory in this way.

Vita of R. Michael Sergeant

Nationally recognized as an innovative and effective leader in the guide dog industry. Sergeant is respected for making a difference in the lives of people with disabilities using carefully and creatively trained dogs.





